4. METAPHOR AND OTHER TROPES (2/17) Susan Sontag sometimes insists that we only think about things literally, without using metaphor, but it is not clear we can do that, because figurative language is so pervasive in all human languages We need to make some basic distinctions, starting with the word Trope. As nouns the difference between metaphor and trope is that metaphor is (uncountable|figure of speech) the use of a word or phrase to refer to something that it isn't, invoking a direct similarity between the word or phrase used and the thing described, but in the case of english without the words like" or "as , which would imply a simile while trope is...

"Giamattista Vico (1668-1744) is usually credited with being the first to identify metaphor, metonymy, synecdoche and irony as the four basic tropes (to which all others are reducible), although this distinction can be seen as having its roots in the Rhetorica of Peter Ramus (1515-72) (Vico 1744, 129-31).

Definition and Examples of the Master Tropes

The four master tropes are metaphor, metonymy, synecdoche, and irony. These figures or tropes play a central role in the organization of both literary works and systems of thought. Every figure of speech can be divided into two parts corresponding to what is literally said and what is meant.

Metaphorgotten - TV Tropes

Slippery Jim replies, "Other than being contained in a mixed and disgusting metaphor I think the idea is a suicidal one." Happens constantly in the Aubrey-Maturin books. Usually in the form of Jack mixing a metaphor, Stephen "helpfully" correcting him, and Jack becoming even more confused.

Mixed Metaphor - TV Tropes

Alice uses a figure of speech. Bob reiterates the usual metaphorical meaning. Alice says no, she meant it literally. There's also a variation in which Bob questions the metaphor, and Alice responds sarcastically that she meant it literally. Trope denotes figurative and metaphorical language and one which has been used in various technical senses. The term trope derives from the Greek τρόπος (tropos), "a turn, a change", related to the root of the verb τρέπειν (trepein), "to turn, to direct, to alter, to change"; this means that the term is used metaphorically to denote, among other things, metaphorical language.
